PRB-1 LANGUAGE ON THE BOOKS IN MASSACHUSETTS

A new Massachusetts law will put the language of the FCC's federal preemption of state and local laws affecting amateurs (PRB-1) on the books in the Bay State whenit takes effect in 1996. H-2782, a bill in the Massachusetts legislature, was written by ARRL Volunteer Counsel Thomas Carrigan, WA1NVS, in 1992.

Both legislative chambers finally approved the bill earlier this year. Gov. William Weld sent the measure back to lawmakers for modification, and the legislature enacted the bill in the final week of this year's session. Weld signed it into law November 21, 1995.

The bill becomes law 90 days after signing. It's assigned to Chapter 225 of the Massachusetts General Law.

WEATHER OR NOT

Every day except week ends there are several sections of the weather net. The net meets Monday through Friday at 6:30 AM, 5:30 PM and a late night session at 10:00 PM. If you are interested in weather we would like to have you join one or more of the weather net sessions. It is interesting to see how the weather changes from one part of Vermont to another part of New Hampshire. It is fun to feel that you are part of a reporting team that is gathering vital information on the varieties of our New England weather. You do not need fancy equipment to join. Just report the weather at your location as you see it at the time you take your observations.

We like to have the weather reported in the following order--- First we like to have the outside temperature. However you get it is certainly OK. It is a bit awkward to physically go outside to read a thermometer so some of us have those large dial thermometers mounted outside in a protected spot. We can shine a flashlight out the window and read the temperature. Way to go ! A thermometer taped to the window on the shady side of the house also works well. Where ever you mount the thermometer try to find a spot that the sun will not shine directly on it. Radio Shack and others have an Outdoor/Indoor thermometer that works great and the temperatures read out in figures that are easy to read. These thermometers have a long thin tube that has a small bulb on the end. You can route the tube under the window and storm window and mount it outside. I stick a small piece of styrofoam over the bulb to keep the sun off it. That seems to work satisfactory. My unit reads the outside and inside temperature and has an extra feature in that it reads the high and low temperatures for the day. This works great and the unit costs around \$25.00. My wife likes to read the low temperature reading early in the morning and I like to watch the high temperature of the day. Any way that you can devise to read the outside temperature without having to go outside in the howling blizzard at 20 degrees below zero is the way to go.

Secondly we like to have your judgement of the sky cover at your location. You do need to go outside to see the sky for this one. Sometimes we can not see the sky because of dense fog, blowing heavy snow, dense smoke, thick haze, ect. In this case you would report "Sky obscured by ---" If somehow you forgot to look outside and it is net time then just report "Sky cover missing." and that is accurate enough. This covers the cases where you can't or didn't see the sky.

Now if you can see the sky and there only a very few clouds you report it "CLEAR" If there are more than just a few clouds but you can see sky here and there the proper report would be "PARTLY CLOUDY" See, already you are a good weather observer.

You will hear some of us using terms such as scattered and broken clouds. You really don't need to get that exact but clear is generally conceded to be up to 2/10 of the sky covered. If the clouds are covering from 3/10 to 5/10 we call it scattered. From 5/10 to 8/10 cloud cover we call it broken. From 8/10 to completely covered is called overcast. You don't need to worry about the exactness of the sky cover just look up there and give us your estimate. No one is checking on you - we just need your best judgement and any way you report the sky is certainly OK. Some of our observers give the sky cover in tenths and that is OK also. If someone reports the sky cover as two tenths then I call it either clear or scattered - it isn't all that important what is important is that there are a few clouds floating around at that location.

Some observers report broken overcast. I think it must be an overcast sky with breaks in the cover here and there. Overcast still covers this but they are trying to be more accurate. Fine with me as any way it is reported is OK and anyway we have a good feeling of what the sky cover is at their location and that is what it is all about anyway.

A good viewing location is in an area where there are no lights. When we come out of the house it takes a few minutes for our eyes to become accustomed to the dark. Find a location where lights don't interfere and take a few minutes to look around for familiar stars in certain parts of the sky. Observing the sky at night is a difficult job at the best so do the best you can. If some stars you normally see are missing a PARTLY CLOUDY call would be best.

Third is probably the hardest part - the wind speed and direction. In the daytime it is not so hard to guess the wind direction but at night it can be a problem. I wet a finger and hold it up. The side that is coolest is the direction that the wind is blowing from. The wind speed is a bit harder but then you can hedge a bit. Calm is no wind at all. Then you can report a light breeze, a moderate or heavy wind or a gale. Maybe you can think up more descriptive terms. We mainly need to know the direction and a rough idea of how strong the wind is. The weather bureau uses an average so if you have gusty winds, and who doesn't, use an average speed. People report a westerly wind from 1 to 3 miles per hour. A better report would be a westerly wind at 2 miles per hour. but however you report it we will accept it that way.

A few years ago I bought a tube that had a small foam rubber ball in the bottom. The tube was made so that when you held it upright and let the wind blow on it the ball would rise up and you could read the speed off a calibrated scale on the tube. It worked fine. Then I put on my Christmas List that I would like an anemometer for Santa to drop down the chimney. The anemometer had a wind direction pointer on it and some rotating cups. In the winter in sleety conditions the cups sometimes freeze and won't turn. I can hear the wind whistling outside and my readout shows zero wind speed. Oh well, just wait for warmer weather and the thing will work again. In the mean time I can report the wind is easterly and blowing a gale.

Next we like to have a barometer reading. If you don't have a barometer just report barometer missing. If you do have one it should be calibrated. Don't let that scare you. Just use it as it is until some day you hear every one report nearly the same barometer reading and then you set yours about the same reading. The really important thing to weather people is not the actual reading but whether the barometer is rising or falling and if it is changing slowly or rapidly. You don't need a really fancy barometer just one of those panels you have seen with 3 meters or dials on them. One is for temperature, one for humidity and one a barometer. Those barometers, while not very accurate, give readings that serve our purposes very well. I like to take a felt tip marker pen and mark the highest reading and the lowest reading. Then when a winter storm is approaching or a summer storm I watch and remark the extremes. It really is interesting and a fun thing to do. A falling barometer usually indicates inclement weather and a rising barometer usually indicates good sunny dry weather. Today mine reads over 30 and it is overcast and raining. So much for what it is supposed to do.

Finally we have a remark section. Here we report rainfall, high and low temperatures, especially gusty winds, lighting, and anything you feel others might be interested in. There are all sorts of rain gauges. I bought one that reads to one hundredth of an inch. I don't know what that accuracy buys me as any reading to about one quarter of an inch is OK. A coffee can set out in a clear area and a ruler works very well indeed. A few rocks placed around the can to hold it in place in windy weather works fine.

People always ask, "What do you guys do with the weather that you report." My answer is that I don't know.

Lots of people listen to our reports and judge from that as to what may be coming their way. Occasionally the weather bureau listens in to get a feel of what is going on. Mostly it is just fun to record the daily results at your house. Next month or next year it is fun to look back over the records and see what the weather was then. It is just another fun thing that we amateurs do. Join us on the 146.76 machine and you may help us get the weather in your locality. You may find it fun and even habit forming. We welcome you to any of the three daily sessions. Come on out and see the Weather or Not.
