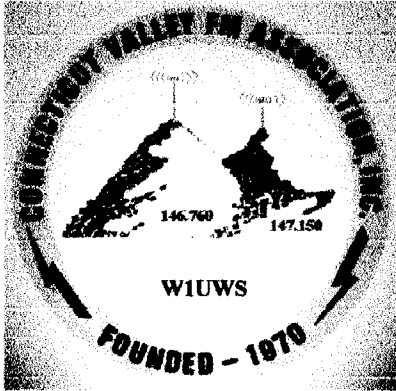

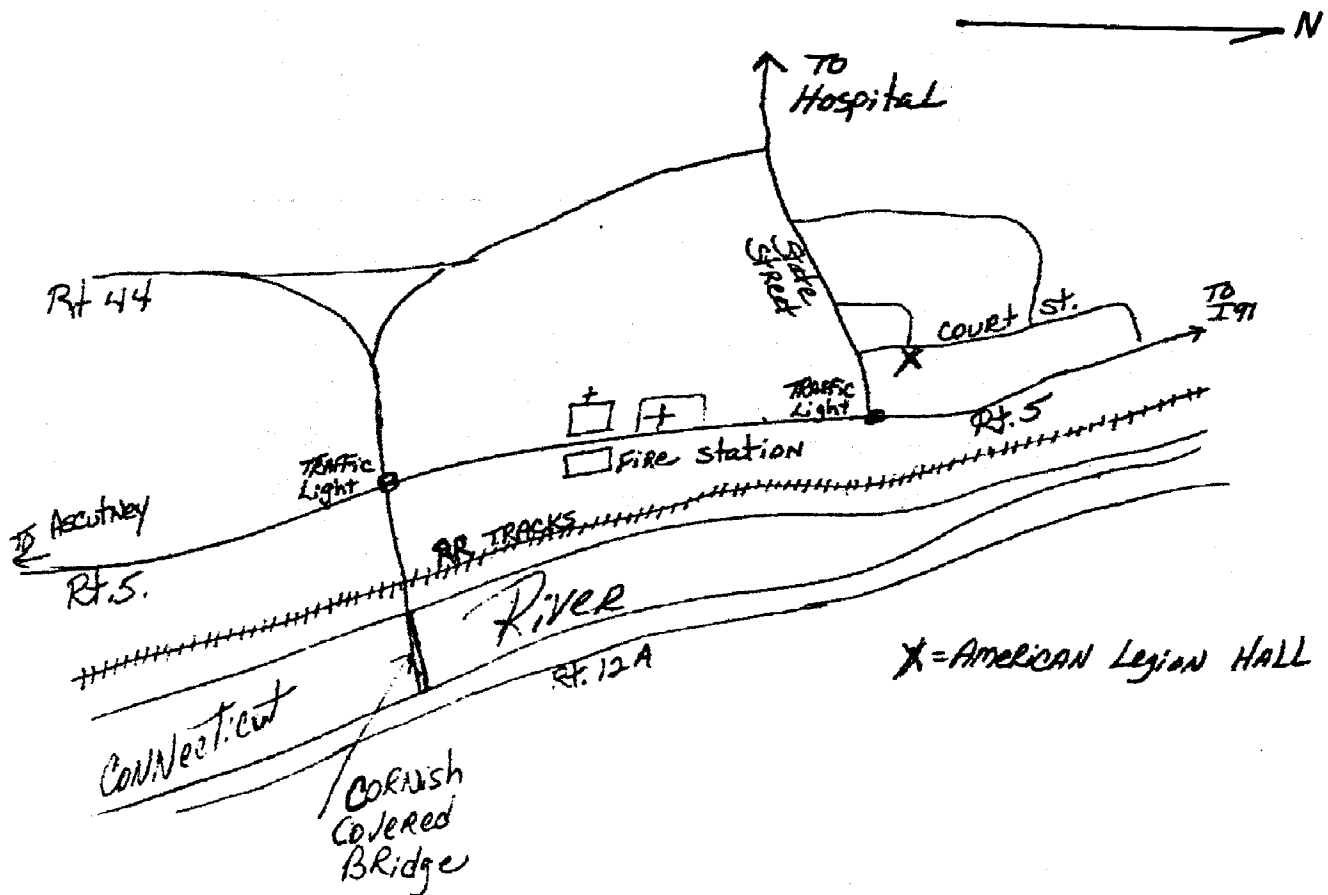
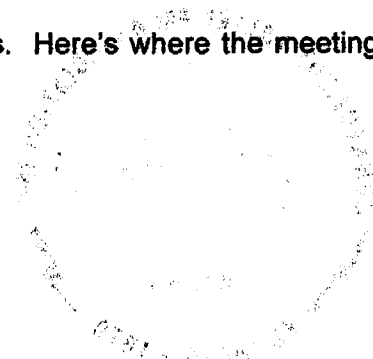
So a hunt started for a place that wasn't already booked for Easter activities. Here's where the meeting and potluck dinner will be held. We will save a chair for you, see you there.

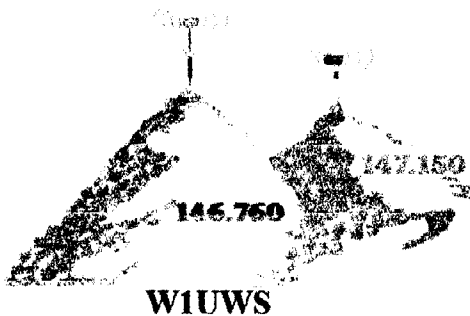

Report of the Repeater Trustee

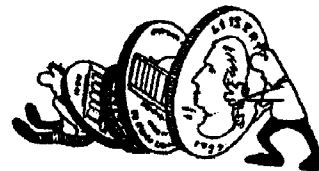
Not much happening this time of year. The club has purchased a Wacom 2 meter duplexer on the E-Bay auction.

The Association will be sponsoring a test session on **Saturday, May 5th**, in the Sugar River Savings Bank Community Room (on Main Street, Newport, NH). Doors open at 8 a.m. and close at 8:45 a.m. when testing for all levels starts.

Preregistration is now required!

Bring with you.

- a) original FCC-issued license (if already licensed)
- b) Copy of original license (if already licensed)
- c) Original CSCEs you are claiming
- d) Copies of original CSCEs you are claiming
- e) one photo ID, or two non-photo IDs (one with an address)
- f) at least one pen, two pencils and a non-programmable calculator
- g) \$10.00 for the license fee for all Technician, General, and Extra exams.

All applicants are expected to have materials that they need and have all paperwork organized; this will help all concerned.

ARRL to Reconsider Code Stance

Since 1993 it has been ARRL policy to oppose any effort to drop the Morse code as an international licensing requirement for amateur radio. But with national associations around the world deciding the requirement has outlived its usefulness, and with the ARRL casting the sole "no" vote at the International Amateur Radio Union Region 3 conference last year, the League's Board of Directors has decided to revisit the issue at its January 2001 meeting. According to the ARRL Letter, the board may reaffirm its current position, modify it or seek input from members.

The next time the matter will come up for a vote in an international forum is at an IARU Region 2 conference this coming October, suggesting the League board may be able to wait until its July meeting to make a decision. However, ARRL sources tell CQ that position papers on various topics are due by June, so the board may not want to wait that long and possibly lose out on taking the leadership position on the issue in our own IARU region.

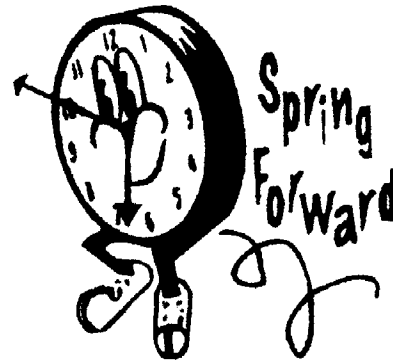



Editor's Note - This article was written by Frank Finger NU1A and appeared in the 1992 Spring issue of the CVFMA Newsletter. Numerous people asked if it could be reprinted again so here it is.....enjoy.

Weather Or Knot?

Everyone talks about the weather and nobody does anything about it! in that respect the CVFMA weather nets do a good job of reporting the weather. It is most interesting over here in New Hampshire as we find out what weather we will have two or three hours later. I thought that a short discussion of the items of the weather reports would be of interest to some of our listeners and possibly to some of our weather reporters.

(The CVFMA weather net meets weekdays at 6:30am, 5:30pm and 10:00pm on 146.76. The NH Net meets weekdays at 9:55pm on 146.94. All Hams are invited to participate.)

I start out my report with the name of the city or town where I am located. Then I report the temperature. Some of us have digital thermometers that read out to tenths of a degree. For the life of me I cant tell what difference a tenth of a degree makes to anyone so I report it to the nearest degree.

Radio Shack sells a nice little indoor-outdoor thermometer. The case is 3 ½ by 5 inches and ½ inch thick. It has a little probe on the end of a thin white cord that is about 6 feet long. The cord runs under my window sash and out through a crack in the storm window frame and the probe mounts on the edge of the window sill. It is on the easterly side of the house so I have it covered with a piece of thick styrofoam and a piece of aluminum foil to reflect the sun's heat in the morning. The air reaches the probe through a hole in the bottom. This arrangement seems to work very well. Inside the house the readout displays the current outdoor temperature plus the high and low for the day. I must remember to reset it before going to bed so the max. and min. readings will be correct. Sounds a little fancy but it sure is nice to read the outdoor temperatures from the comfort of a nice warm room!

The second item of the report is the sky condition. I go outside and look up at the sky and try to judge just how much of the sky is covered with clouds. The weather bureau has a system. If there is one tenth or less of the sky covered with clouds it is called CLEAR. If more than one tenth of the sky is covered but less than four tenths then it is called SCATTERED. If more than four tenths but less than eight tenths of the sky is covered by clouds it is called BROKEN, and anything greater than eight tenths is called OVERCAST.

With Overcast it is possible to have occasional holes in the clouds. The degree of coverage is a judgment call and no one will argue with you when you make your decision.

Some reporters occasionally report Broken Overcast. There is no such condition! It should be reported either Broken or Overcast. You may then add a comment such as "breaks in the overcast" in the remarks section of the report. Way to go!!

Next is the wind direction and speed. The direction is the direction from which the wind is coming. The speed can be reported as miles per hour or as calm, light, moderate, or gale. Either way is certainly OK.

Now I state the precipitation, if any, at the present time.

Next is the barometer reading. If you don't have a barometer just leave it out. Barometer changes are of interest as a falling barometer usually means that inclement weather is on the way and if it is falling fast then it will probably be quite windy very soon. A rising barometer usually means good weather with clearing skies to come.

Now is the place for remarks which may include the high and low temperatures for the day, the amount of total rainfall or snowfall and any other information that may be of interest such as "breaks in the overcast".

Weather reporting is a fun project and while it is nice to conform to the above definitions it is not all that important and we love to have your reports in whatever form you desire to give them.

Join us in reporting the weather. You will find it great fun and we will all profit from your reports. Try it - maybe you'll like it!

(By law Amateur Radio operators cannot gather weather information over the air for the benefit of or with the intention that the information will be used by commercial radio or TV stations. However, commercial broadcast stations can and frequently do monitor Amateur weather net communications and are free to use the information in their weather broadcasts.)

STIRRING MEMORIES

This recipe was brought to the October General Meeting by Nancy Whynall (wife of W4PAS) and went like wildfire. So here's the recipe.....

Raspberry - Walnut Shortbread Bars

Shortbread Base - Combine

1 1/4 C. flour and 1/2 C. sugar. Cut in 1/2 C. margarine until mixture is like a fine meal. Press into bottom of lightly greased 9" square pan. Bake at 350 for 20 min. or until edges are golden. Remove from oven and spread with 1/3 C. raspberry jam.

Topping

2 eggs 1/8 tsp salt 1 tsp vanilla 1C. Chopped walnuts
 1/2 C. brown sugar 1/8 tsp baking soda 2 tbsp flour

Beat eggs with brown sugar and vanilla until well blended. Stir in flour mixed with salt and soda. Add walnuts. Spoon over jam and spread lightly to comers of pan. Return to oven and bake 20 -25 min. longer until top is set. Cool in pan then cut into bars.

Recipe may be doubled and baked in 9" X 13" pan. Time could take a bit longer.
